Washington City, May 21.

The bill reported yesterday in the H. of R. by the title of "a bill to encourage ship-building in the United States," proposes an allowance to the owner of any vessel of over 20 tons burthen, built, equipped, repaired, or supplied in the United States, of a drawback of the amount of duties which now are or may be hereafter levied on the iron and sail-cloth consumed in the building, &c. on the quantity of hemp the iron and san-cion constity of hemp building, &c. on the quantity of hemp and unhackled flax used in the cordage, and sail-cloth, consumed for the purposes aforesaid, when manufactured in the United States; provided that no drawback shall be allowed unless in the United States; provided that no drawback shall be allowed unless claimed within twenty days after completing the equipment, &c.: that no amount of drawback shall be allowed on foreign convass beyond the amount of duty which the foreign raw material would have borne had it been manufactured in the United States: and that no amount of drawback shall be allowed no amount of drawback shall be allowed less than 50 dollars. The bill also provides for allowing a drawback of two cents per pound on all cordage and ca-bles manufactured in the United States from foreign hemp and exported in con-formity to existing laws for the benefit of drawback.

It is not probable that this bill will be acted upon at the present session of Congress.

A scientific correspondent in the Jublin Journal, says that a young Offin Journal, says that a young Officer of high rank in the army has invented a substitute for steam, in an expansive vapour, which, when produced, does not require any addition of fuel or fluid, for a very long period, as it repeats its works, escaping and returning through the same cylinder. It is derived from a compound of sulphur, charcoal, and two other ingredients which are not named, which, with a tea spoonful of fluid heated to 100 degrees less than boiling water, will give sufficient vapour to raise a ton of water.
