*Engineering Gazette.*—About 600 of those Indians have crossed the Arkansas, at this place, during the last two days, on their way to their new homes in the vicinity of the Kiowas. They are conducted by Capt. Pace, U. S. A.

The steamboat Compromise, Capt. Cochrane, arrived on Monday last, from New Orleans, with intelligence for all the merchants of our town, and directed for same port.

By this arrival we have been put in possession of New Orleans papers to the 30th ult., but find no news of importance in them. The following quotations we extract from Levy's Price Current of Stocks:

*Stealing loss of lives.*—By Capt. Dean, U. S. A., who arrived last evening, from Mouth of White river, we learn, that the steam-boat St. Martin, laden with cotton, was recently burnt near Natchez, and that between 30 and 40 lives were lost.

*The Tea Sections and Statehouse Fund.*—Our readers will find, on our first page to-day, Gov. Fors's Message to the Legislature, containing a report of his proceedings in relation to the disposal of the Tea Sections, and the progress of the State, now erecting or the proceeds of the sales thereof.

*Mr. Crittenden's House.*—As so much has been said in relation to the magnificence and great value of the Dwelling-house, &c., which was offered by Mr. Crittenden to the Legislature, at the session in 1831, in exchange for the Tea Sections, and which so many of that body were so anxious to accept, it may be improper to state, that Mr. Crittenden sold that property, last week, for the sum of six thousand seven hundred dollars, and we believe it will satisfy with the price obtained in it. By reference to the Governor's report on our first page, it will be seen, that he sold eight acres of the same land for the sum of twenty thousand five hundred and four dollars, and the sections still remain unsold, for which the sum of \$100 more will no doubt be obtained. Commence a new era.

We are compelled, for want of room, to omit the proceedings of the Legislature during the last two days of its session, Friday and Saturday last. The reader, however, of the second section may be gratified, at this time, by the list of Acts published in our paper to-day.
