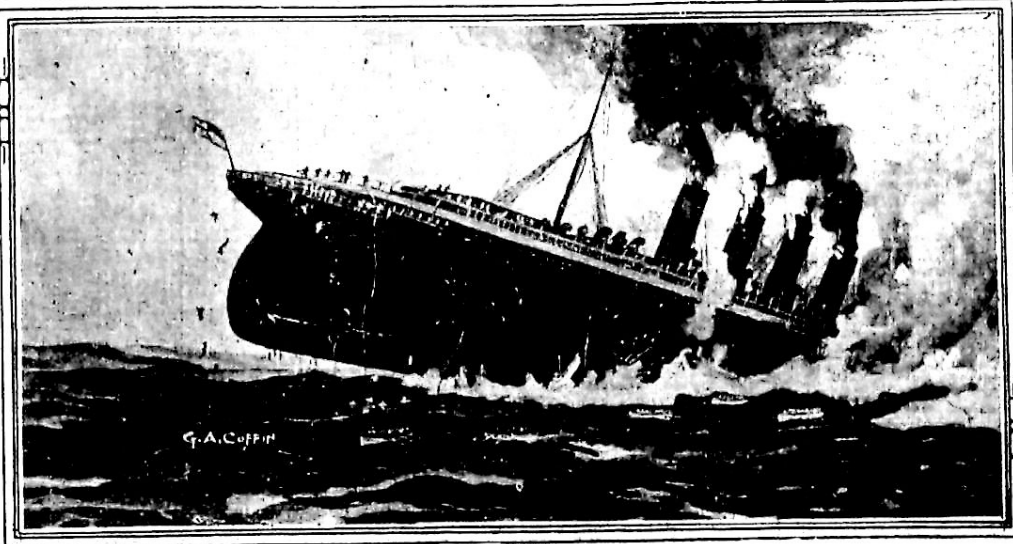

BIG BUILDING IN ARGENTA BURNING

Matthews' Structure, Occupying Whole Block, Doomed—Forty Are Homeless.

Fire, discovered at 4 o'clock this (Wednesday) morning, completely destroyed the big Matthews' building which occupies the corner of the east side of Main street, between Second and Third streets, Argenta. The building is two stories in height. The lower lower floors are occupied by stores of more business firms, among them the largest in Argenta. The upper floor is occupied by apartments, in which reside more than 40 families. At 4:30 o'clock the building was still in flames and there was no hope of saving it. The Argenta fire department, by the Little Rock department, was sent to the scene to assist in extinguishing the fire. The fire was extinguished at 6:30 o'clock. Washington, May 11.—Former President Theodore Roosevelt tonight made a plea for prompt action by the United States on account of the Lusitania disaster while commenting on President Wilson's speech of last night. Mr. Roosevelt was particularly perturbed in that part of the president's speech which referred to "such a thing as a man being too proud to fight" and "a nation being so right that it does not need to vindicate either by force or by right." "I think that China is entitled to draw all the comfort she can from this statement," Mr. Roosevelt said, "and it would be well for the United States to ponder seriously what the effect on China has been of managing her foreign affairs during the last 15 years on this theory."
