

WILSON ORDER ENTIRE NATIONAL GUARD OF U. S.; FIRST ARKANSAS TROOPS REPORT AT FT. ROOTS TODAY

100,000 TROOPS ARE AFFECTED BY MILITIA CALL

Mobilization of the State Forces Will Begin at Once.

ARE UNDER FUNSTON

55,000 Men Already Are on Border With General Pershing.

GOVERNORS ARE NOTIFIED

Washington, June 18.—Virtually the entire mobile strength of the National Guard of the United States was ordered tonight to the federal service to assist President Wilson.

Simultaneously with the National Guard Secretary of War Baker ordered the Navy Department, ordered additional war vessels to Mexican waters on both coasts to safeguard American lives.

At the War, Navy and State Departments, it was stated that no new orders in the situation in Mexico had been received to precipitate the new orders.

Within the last two weeks, however, tension has been increasing steadily. The crisis precipitated by General Carranza's note demanding the recall of General Pershing's expeditionary forces has been followed by a virtual ultimatum served on the American officer by General Trevino, the Mexican commander inihuahua.

Officially, administration officials had no statement to issue tonight that the troops were ordered to the border.

By the new orders there will be placed at General Funston's disposal two major generals, 21 brigadier generals, 100 colonels, 1,000 captains, 10,000 lieutenants, 100,000 privates and 10,000 sergeants.

RETIRE TO THE INTERIOR

Americans Reach Douglas in Automobiles From Nogales, Where Hostile Demonstration Occurs.

Douglas, Ariz., June 18.—Military authorities in the state of Sonora, Mex., have seized the Southern Pacific of Mexico railway system and cut all the telegraph and telephone wires at the border.

Several Americans were brought to the border tonight in automobiles from Nogales, Mex., with an anti-American demonstration occurred today.

From Colonia Dublin, Mex., there were reports that the Carranza soldiers are arming the civilians in the Casas Grandes district, but the report was unconfirmed.

No alarm was occasioned by reports that Mexican forces were marching in the direction of Douglas, Ariz., in regard to the possibility of a clash between General Pershing's forces and Carranzan army officers said the former would not be caught unaware.

CARRANZISTAS PARADE

March Through Streets of Nuevo Laredo, Mex.—Demonstration Quelled.

Laredo, Tex., June 18.—Five hundred Carranzan soldiers and 250 artillerymen marched through the streets of Nuevo Laredo, Mex., opposite here, today and paraded through the streets of that town.

An anti-American demonstration is being held in the town of Nuevo Laredo last night by Gen. Raynaldo de la Garza, who after Eustilio Lopez, the Carranzan chief, addressed the crowd stating that Mexico was on the verge of war and urging all to show their patriotism to fight the United States.

It was reported during the day that General Silliman likely would arrive here tonight, but he was not among the Americans arriving.

The Long Expected Order Calling Out National Guard for Service on Border

Washington, June 18.—The president's order calling the National Guard into the federal service of the governor of each state in the form of the following telegram, signed by Secretary Baker:

Organizations to be accepted into federal service should have the minimum peace strength now prescribed for organized militia. The maximum strength at which organizations will be accepted and to which they should be raised as soon as possible, is prescribed in section two, tables of organization, United States Army.

Circular 19, division of militia affairs, 1914, prescribes the organization of militia units as part of the tactical division and only these organizations will be accepted into service.

Where recognized brigades or divisions are called into service from a state, the staff officers pertaining to these units under tables of organization, United States Army, will be mustered into service.

NEW MEXICO GUARD MOVES TO EL PASO

Juarez Garrison Also Is Reinforced, and Other Precautions Taken.

El Paso, Tex., June 18.—Apparent preparations were being made on both sides of the international border here tonight for possible hostilities.

The Juarez garrison of the National Guard, consisting of about 100 troops from Chihuahua City, while Battery A of the New Mexico National Guard, 140 men, arrived here tonight.

KILL TWO MEXICANS WHILE WITHDRAWING

Major Anderson's Rear Guard Engages Band of Outlaws Near Matamoros.

NO AMERICAN CASUALTIES

General Parker Orders Troops to Return After Ricard's Promise to Ban Down Bandits.

Brownsville, Tex., June 18.—In a rear guard action during the withdrawal of the Anderson expedition from Mexican soil this morning, two bandits were killed and two others were wounded.

The withdrawal followed the dispersal of the bandit band which attacked a detachment of the Twenty-sixth Infantry camp of San Benito Friday night and the promise of the Carranzan commander at Matamoros to run down and punish the outlaws.

Military authorities regarded the situation as fraught with the gravest possibilities. This is occasioned by the apparent fact that the rear guard detachment of about 16 soldiers of the Mexican de facto government, led by General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, was found to be composed partly of the uniform of a Carranza soldier.

The attack on the rear guard was made by two troops and machine gun troops of the Third Cavalry, which retreated to the United States.

The outpost reported the appearance of a small band of mounted men, who, on seeing the Americans, opened fire. Troop E quickly replied and was joined by the other troops.

The firing continued for 10 to 15 minutes. Two men were seen to fall from the ranks of the band.

The cavalry then charged the Mexicans, who fled in the direction of Matamoros and the transport Hancock.

The first expedition, commanded by Lieut. A. D. Newman, crossed the Rio Grande at the mouth of the river.

The bandits and only one American fled their stay on the Mexican side.

The retreat of the expedition began at the mouth of the river.
