## The Long Expected Order Calling Out National Guard for Service on Border

Washington, June 18.—The president's order calling the National Guard into the federal service went to the governor of each state in the form of the following telegram, signed by Secretary Baker: "Having in view the possibility of further aggression upon the territory of the United States from Mexico and the necessity for the proper protection of that frontier, the president has thought proper to exercise the authority vested in him by the constitution and laws and call out the organized militia and the National Guard necessary for that purpose. I am in consequence instructed by the president to call into the service of the United States forthwith, through you, the following units of the organized militia and the National Guard of the state of sembled at the state mobilization point, state eaung ground (or at the places to be designated to you by the commanding general.—department), for muster into the service of the United States: (Hare follows a list of the organizations to be furnished by the designated state). "Organizations to be accepted into federal service should have the minimum strength at which organizations will be accepted and to which they should be raised as soon as possible, is prescribed in section two, tables of organization, United States are the maximum strength at which organizations will be accepted and to which they should be raised as soon as possible, is prescribed in section two, tables of organization, United States Army.
